Preservación Cultural (Cultural Preservation)

(200-300 different Indigenous bands, or groups, lived in this part of Texas. When the missions started, Spanish became the language here. Over time, the Indigenous languages were lost.)

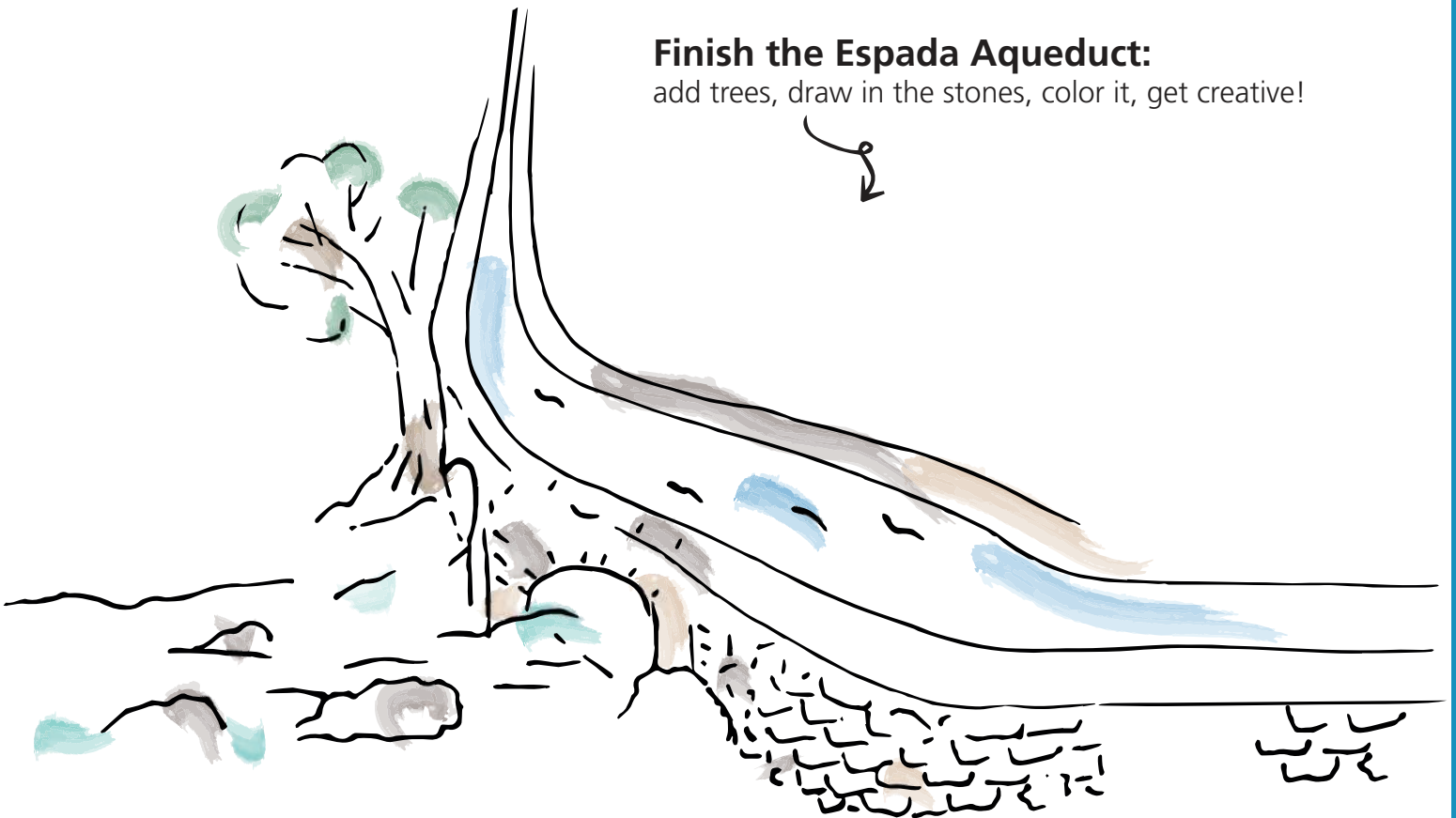
As you visit the missions, take a photo of something you want to remember and share it with a park ranger.

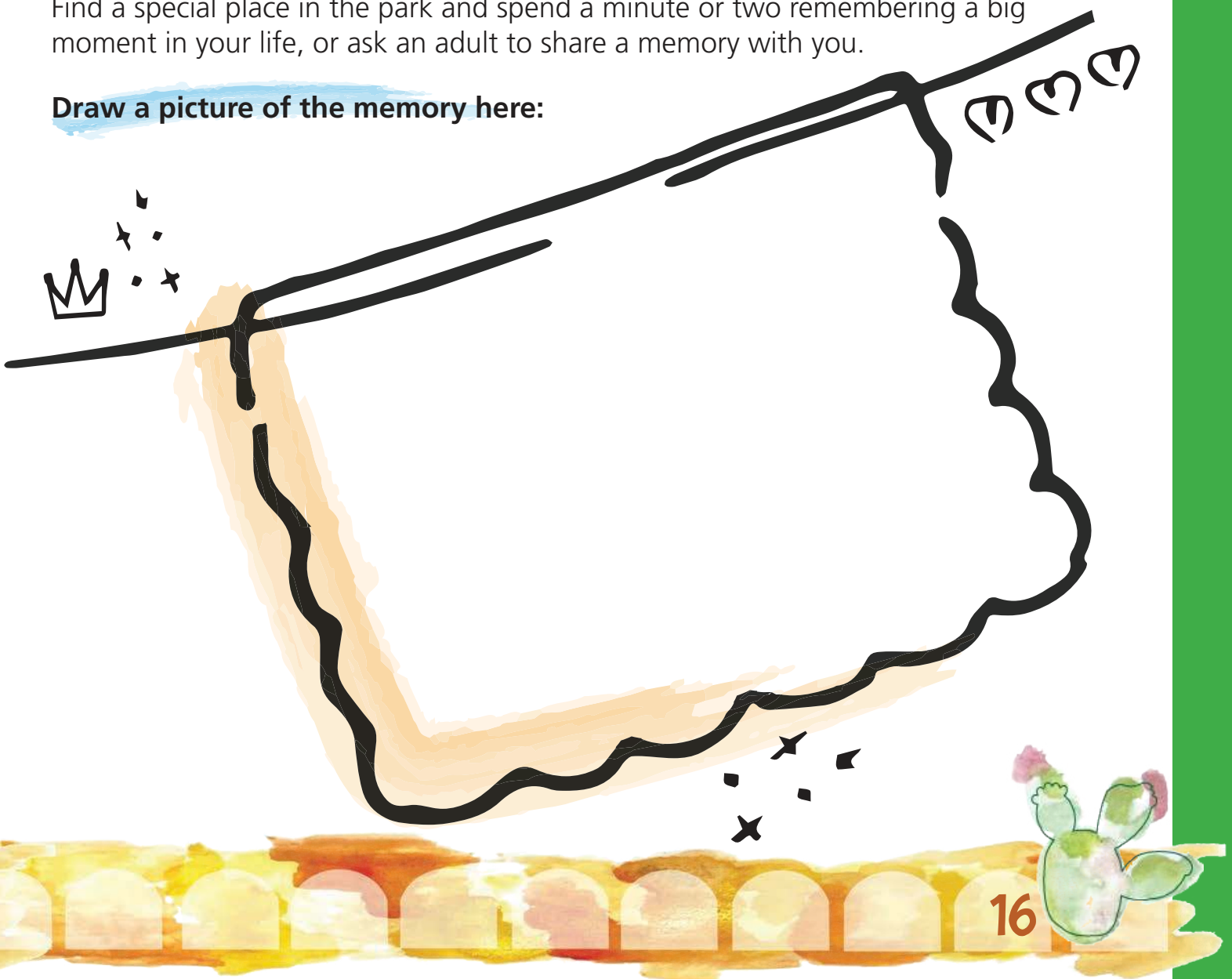
Connect with Our Past

How did you have fun in the park today?

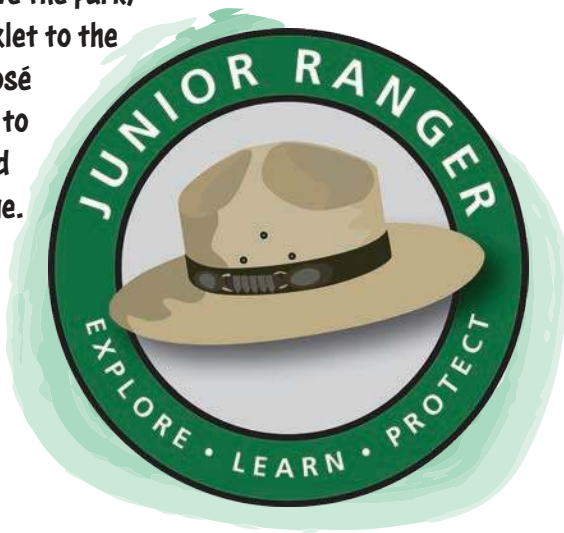
